The Eastern Pulaski Community School Corporation acknowledges the intent of the Annual Performance Report but respectfully takes exception with this current report as the EPCSC believes these numbers are exceedingly misleading. For example, "Non-Operating Expenditures" include expenditures that are not related to the day-to-day operation such as facility acquisition and construction and debt service. This means that the major renovations that

operation such as facility acquisition and construction and cebt service. This means that the major renovations that have taken place the last two years were not related to "Operational Expenditures" which is accurate, however, it is important to note that funding for all of the renovation expenditures including nearly \$200,000 for asbestos removal did not come from the General Fund.

Public school corporations in Indiana have "silos" of funds that can only be used for certain items. The EPCSC

believes this report is misleading by giving the reader the appearance that all the monies are in one fund/account and, based on the total dollars expended, that the percents towards the Academic Achievement and Instructional Support Expenditures were both drastically reduced to pay for the much-needed renovations. This is inaccurate. The EPCSC
